Cities in Transformation: Lee Kuan Yew World City Prize is a new publication that talks about the winners of the 2010 and 2012 editions of the award. The 128-page book includes a foreword by Singapore's first Prime Minister, after whom the prize is named, and offers indepth insight into the transformative stories of 11 cities, with practical solutions and ideas that might be adopted by other cities around the world. Prize laureates New York (2012) and Bilbao (2010) have shown that bold leadership and creative solutions can indeed turn cities around. Special Mention megacities like Delhi and Ahmedabad offer real hope in tackling issues such as housing, transport and pollution, while Copenhagen and Malmo provide valuable lessons in close collaboration. Stunning full-colour photography – of everything from cityscapes to architectural wonders to innovative urban design strategies – additionally gives readers a rare (and literal) glimpse into the cities that are leading the way in inspired urban planning. Cosy Retreat

This is outdoor comfort taken to a whole new level. Dedon, renowned for its luxe outdoor furniture, has just introduced the City Camp collection, designed for "modern nomads". The swing version boasts a sturdy hanging system, while the daybed features a table element for alfresco dining and comes with a tatami-style mattress or, alternatively, a plush, foldable mattress. Tucked away in a corner of Hong Kong's Soho district is a new design store with a host of collectibles waiting to be discovered. L's Where is the brainchild of Lime Design founder Alfred Lam, who specialises in high-end residential projects across the region. Lam has been collecting antique furniture and exclusive art pieces for many years through the course of his frequent travels. One of the reasons he opened the store, he says, was to share his treasure trove of finds with people who enjoy art, rather than having to keep everything locked up in a warehouse. Heavy Metal

Award-winning interior designer Kamini Ezralow recently introduced her first-ever collection of furniture in conjunction with Italian firm Orsi. The series derives its name, Bronze, from the fact that each of the initial eight designs – she intends to add more pieces later – features some sort of bronze detailing. The items include a woven-cashmere headboard, a painted folding screen, parchment-covered dining chairs and a set of pedestals with mirror tops. Bronze's aesthetics mimic the elegance of Art Deco, with its clean lines, fine Italian materials and luxurious finishes yielding a polished yet understated feel – a reflection of the interiors Ezralow creates for her discerning clients.
