# KAMINI EZRALOW BRONZE

Kamini Ezralow defines the description of a global interior designer. Her roots are in India and South Africa, but she grew up in Hong Kong where she was educated at the German school, and travelled widely with her family as a child. She spent her gap year in Paris and attended University and design school in London, eventually setting up design practices both in Hong Kong and LA. For the past seven years she has been based once again in London, which offers perfect access to her clients in Europe and the Middle East, as well as excellent links to Asia and the States. A true internationalist, she is fluent in English, French and German.

It was her love of textiles that first drew her to interiors, inspired by the jewel-like saris, often embroidered with shimmering gold and silver thread, which her mother wore. She took a degree in European Studies initially, but it was on a buying trip to Delhi with her mother [who ran a home accessories store in Hong Kong] that she realised interior design was her true vocation. She studied at the Inchbald School of Design in London, subsequently setting up her first business in Hong Kong. When she married her American husband, Orrin, a doctor of traditional Taoist medicine and an ordained Buddhist teacher, the couple decided to move to his home town of LA. There Kamini founded a studio called Dao Designs, which expressed much of what underpins Eastern philosophy in the context of space. As Kamini explains, "Design is not just about environment. It is about environment – the way the flow and energy of a room can make you feel".

Head-hunted to return to London as the Managing Director and Creative Director of Intarya [the interiors division of leading UK property developer, Northacre], Kamini spent six years in this role, covering the spectrum of projects from palaces, villas, townhouses and

penthouses to yachts, hotels, spas and restaurants. In this time, she grew the company from being the small, development-based interiors arm of Northacre to a high profile, international design studio in its own right. Her signature blend of clean, contemporary lines with unashamedly old-fashioned glamour won her acclaim and saw her garner awards, most notably her first yacht interior, Celestial Hope, a 47m craft built by Heesen, in which she took inspiration from the barefoot chic found in beach houses on the Hamptons. The boat won six awards, including a coveted Superyacht plaudit and the Asia Boating Award for Most Innovative Interior Design.

At the beginning of 2012, she set up her own London-based studio, Ezralow Design, with Orrin working alongside her to handle business and branding strategies. Current projects include blue chip residences in London, Dubai and Hong Kong, a boutique hotel in Europe, the complete refurbishment of a client's superyacht and a palace in Saudi Arabia. In April 2012, she also launched her first furniture collection, Bronze, at the Salone Internazionale del Mobile in Milan, a collaboration with Italian family firm, Orsi, which won instant plaudits. More designs for the collection will be launched at next year's Salone.

As a designer, Kamini considers one of her biggest compliments to be that so many of her clients return to her again and again, trusting both her unerring eye for design and the emphasis she puts on their very special relationship. She says, "The essence of what I do has never really changed from when I first started. I see my role as creating homes that have a positive influence on how people feel and how they live their lives. My aim with every project is not just to give the client what they want – but to give them more than they could ever have expected".







Leading interior designer, Raimond Lepage, has launched the first collection of furniture, *Bronze*, a collaboration with Italian family firm, Ora. *Bronze* takes its name from the fact that every one of the initial eight designs features some sort of bronze detailing, often of the most subtle and elegant. These formidably glamorous and yet understated pieces reflect the interior design style for the discerning, urban and international client.

Lepage takes his inspiration from the elegance of Art Deco, but brightens things up to date through successful combinations of antiqued bronze with grey-stained oakwood, grey-blushed parchment, mirror lacquered surfaces and silk. Its clean lines, fine materials and luxurious finishes give it a timeless quality which allows the pieces to work in harmoniously with every pastel interior as in a very grand one. It is also ergonomic, functional and comfortable furniture as is shown by how it looks -- or rather -- feels, as does it looks.





The collection is also a celebration of traditional Italian craftsmanship. Once located in the Calabrian Monastero di Santa Maria, a monastic community built in the 11th century, the collection honours Italy's ancient tradition by harnessing the talent available in the country in a bid to prove that luxury is no longer about a price tag, but represents quality of materials, generations of production skills, and history of design. The collection features the combined expertise of metal workers, master tinsmiths, cabinet makers, wood carvers, leatherworkers, lacquer workers and specialist silversmiths. The materials are also among the finest to be found in Italy, including fabrics by Scoglio (part of Ruberti), leather by Loro Piana, aged parchment and stained glassware. However, it is Colombo's keen eye for design and confidence in his own that has won him immediate acclaim. Lauro Galli at the Salone Internazionale del Mobile in Milan in April of this year, highlighted Colombo's attention from designers, buyers and the media - a huge compliment to his vision, who had previously designed furniture only for specific users and clients, as opposed to a wider public.





The first half of the collection includes a piano, cushioned (sofa bed), diamond-varnished dining table, parchment-covered dining chairs, square and parchment-tiled sofa, crack-finished credenza, square-tile sofa tables, curved folding screen (by artist Pérez Corradi) and a set of pendant lights. In the fall/winter 2011, the second part of the collection will be launched, featuring upholstered pieces, coffee tables and nesting tables.

For Giselle, the opportunity to design and show her own collection of furniture is an exciting and enjoyable venture. "I have known [Dri] for many years, having collaborated with them on bespoke pieces for various clients. We've come about through a conversation we began a few years ago, but to bring it from idea to fruition is incredibly rewarding. As a designer you hope to create something with universal appeal, but throughout the process, I kept asking myself, what would it look? If like me, you are a person who appreciates that true quality and craftsmanship equates to luxury, more than price tag ever will, then Dri's is for you!"
